We have been busy in the welfare space with the Shelter Register Aotearoa pilot programme well underway, and projects around A Good Life for companion animals in the pipeline. Dr Erin Jones has been contracted to review and revamp our Animal Behaviour and Accreditation programme and has been busy recruiting new organisations and members. Erin gives us an update below.

We continue to advocate for mandatory desexing, microchipping and registration of cats on the NZ Companion Animal Register by submitting to local councils when their bylaws are due for review. Read on for a summary of which areas have implemented these bylaws.

Shelter Register Aotearoa



Companion Animals NZ, in collaboration with the SPCA and MPI, facilitated a series of workshops with shelter organisations in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch, in 2020. The idea of a Shelter Register was proposed and there was strong agreement that this would be invaluable for providing transparency and facilitating standards around an unregulated industry.

In June 2022, Companion Animals NZ, launched a pilot programme called Shelter Register Aotearoa, an initiative to capture standardised data around the number of cats and dogs moving through animal rescues and shelters in New Zealand. The purpose of the database is to quantify the size of the problem in the industry and understand the associated welfare issues, so action can be taken to improve the situation.

Four main metrics are collected monthly and quarterly results reported. We anonymise the data so no one shelter is identifiable.

The Metrics Include:

- ✓ Species/Age
- ✓ Incoming live animals (stray, surrendered, transferred, born in shelter)
- ✓ Outgoing live animals (adopted, returned to owner, transferred)
- ✓ Other Outcomes (died in care, euthanased)

Number of animals desexed is also recorded.

In addition to being able to assess the scale and nature of the shelter industry, this information will provide many benefits, including the ability to:

- Monitor trends over time,
- Identify gaps in service provision,
- Provide opportunities to collaborate and access resources,
- Provide a support community for shelter staff and volunteers,
- Improve shelter management systems

This will provide:

- Better outcomes for animals currently in the shelters,
- Data that may help direct policies to improve outcomes for companion animals in the future, and
- Regular reporting to the public may help normalise beneficial actions such as desexing and microchipping.

We are now looking to secure funding to house the database on the New Zealand Companion Animal Register, and once established, capture data for other companion animals such as rabbits, horses, birds, etc.

The pilot has been running for four months, with 34 shelters and rescues taking part and capturing data. We need more shelters to take part in this initiative to provide a better picture of the current situation, in order to affect change in the future. Shelters working with cats and dogs can join at any time.

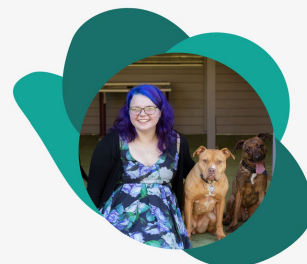

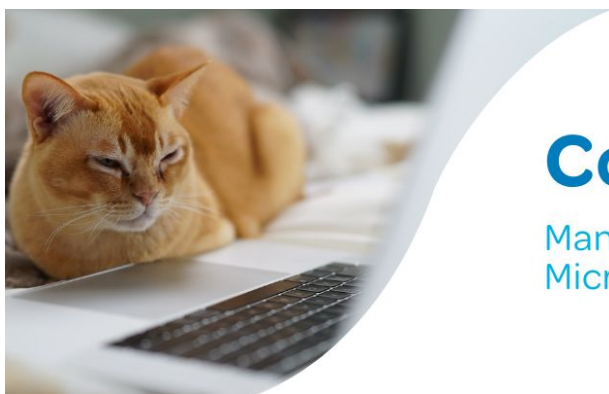

Council Bylaws

Mandatory Desexing,
Microchipping, Registration

The table shows areas that currently require mandatory desexing and microchipping/registration of cats.

Areas That Currently Require Mandatory Desexing and Microchipping/Registration of Cats

Council	Mandatory Desexing	Mandatory Microchipping & Registration on NZCAR	Date implemented
Palmerston North City Council	Yes	Yes	2018
Wellington City Council	No	Yes	2018
Whanganui District Council	Yes	Yes	2021
Whangarei District Council	Yes	Yes	July 2022
Selwyn District Council	No	Yes	July 2022
Ruapehu District Council	Yes	Yes	From 1/12/22

We are currently also submitting to the Buller District Council.

Data from the NZCAR suggests there is an increase in microchipping and registration following implementation of these bylaws, despite lack of enforcement, which is great to see. It is our hope that desexing and microchipping will become more normalised as more councils adopt these requirements.
